

KNOWLEDGE MASTER OPEN

The **Knowledge Master Open** (KMO) is no mere trivia contest. One hundred challenging questions require higher-level thinking skills and cover fourteen curriculum areas, with students earning points for the speed and accuracy of their answers.

We had two fifth grade teams this year. The students on the Denmark teams scored 651 and 563 of 1,000 possible points to place FIRST and THIRD PLACE in the State of Wisconsin. Our first place team took seventh overall in a field of 223 elementary schools nationwide.

READ ACROSS AMERICA



IMMUNIZATION LAW CHANGES FOR 2010-2011

The phase-in process of two new vaccine requirements affecting all Wisconsin schools continues. Next year's requirements are listed below. These requirements can be waived only for health, religious or personal conviction reasons. To claim a waiver for health, religious or personal conviction reasons, contact your child's school office to sign the back of their immunization card.

The varicella vaccine protects against chickenpox. Previously only one dose was required; now a second dose is required. Tdap is the adolescent combination vaccine that protects against tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis (whooping cough). Only one dose is required.

Please make arrangements during the summer to have these required vaccines taken care of at either your family physician's office or through your county's public health department.

For the 2010 - 2011 school year, the following is required:

Students entering Grades K through 2 Grades 6 through 8

Grades 9 through 11

Grade 12

Vaccine(s)

Varicella (2 doses)

Tdap (1 dose) and Varicella (2 doses)

DENMARK CHARTER SCHOOL STUDENTS VISIT UW-MANITOWOC

Students from the Denmark Empowerment Charter School (DECS) recently visited the University of Wisconsin-Manitowoc to enjoy lunch, a tour, and meet with college students who are pursuing teaching degrees. DECS specializes in meeting the needs of underachieving, at-risk students and emphasizes rigor, relevance and relationships in meeting the social, emotional, behavioral and academic needs of the students

DECS students shared their life and school experiences with UW-Manitowoc students enrolled in the course "Concepts, Issues and Fieldwork in Education." The class instructor, Laura Apfelbeck, said she wanted her students to hear first-hand what it means to be an at-risk student or a special education student. "Learning how the charter school environment helps them become engaged in education is also important," she added.

DECS students benefited from the visit, too. "The opportunity to share their personal stories of struggle and success was empowering for them," said Mark Meisner, DECS Lead Teacher. "The students hope their stories created a clear picture of at-risk students' needs."

In addition, DECS students, who sometimes struggle with the conformity that is expected in a traditional classroom, were able to see that there is room for creativity and exploration in higher education at UW-Manitowoc.

Since the spring of 2009, the Denmark School District, through newsletters, news articles and meetings, has tried to notify taxpayers of the Denmark School District about a significant increase in taxes for the 2009-10 school year. Since property tax bills have recently been mailed, some questions have arisen regarding this increase in taxes. Below is information that may help explain the increase and how the district will move forward in the future

- In November of 2008, the voters of the Denmark School District approved \$700,000 in additional spending for the 2009-10 school year. The Denmark School Board approved using **only \$150,000** for the 2009-10 school year. If the entire \$700,000 would have been used, taxes would have been significantly higher.
- In the summer of 2009, the State Legislature and the Governor of Wisconsin approved a two-year state budget that lowered the revenue limit for districts, lowered the equalization aid districts receive from the State to offset property taxes, and continued to divert money from the equalized aid formula to the tax levy credit. Diverting money from equalization aid to the tax levy credit negatively impacts districts like Denmark and favors property rich districts across the state. (According to the *Wisconsin Taxpayers Alliance, December 22, 2009*, the largest increase in school levies was 40% and the largest decrease in school levies was 20%.)
- On October 26, 2009, the Denmark School Board approved the levy for the Denmark School District. At that time, the estimated increase in taxes for property valued at \$200,000 was an increase of approximately \$200 or just under a 12% increase.
- When the School Board sets the levy for the entire district, the assessed value of each municipality is not known by the School Board. The increase or decrease in property taxes, for school district purposes, varies widely across the school district. Differences in tax levies across the district are based on the value of the property in these municipalities.

What does the future hold? There are no easy answers. The conflict between local taxpayers shouldering increases in taxes vs. trying to maintain quality programs in the Denmark School District will be ongoing.

The district will continue to reduce positions and eliminate waste as well as continue to become more energy efficient. The district has reduced administration this past year and will continue to downsize administration and staff as the district enrollment continues to decline. For the 2010-11 school year, all district schools will be on a quarter/semester schedule to better utilize shared teaching staff across the district. We will not employ new staff unless student numbers increase or we need the correct teacher certification required by the State of Wisconsin.

What about the long-term financial health of the Denmark School District?

- 1. The district has only three years of payments left on the Middle School building and on a capital improvement loan. Starting in 2013-14, the long-term debt will be reduced by half to approximately \$750,000 per year. In the year 2015-16, payments on the High School addition will be complete, leaving the district with no long-term debt for the 2016-17 school year. This will reduce taxes by \$1.5 million per year from present costs.
- 2. The district paid off a long-term debt this past year to the Wisconsin Retirement System. These additional dollars can now be diverted to other needs of the district.
- 3. We need to convince the Wisconsin legislature and the Governor that school districts must have revenues that match expenses. The State and school districts cannot operate on deficit budgeting each and every year.

All of us need to lobby our legislators immediately to have dollars going to the equalization aid formula instead of the tax levy credit. This change alone would benefit about 75% of the districts across Wisconsin and the taxpayers within those districts.
