### EARLY CHILDHOOD CENTER

The School District of Denmark is committed to providing high quality Early Childhood programs that instill a love of learning and create the building blocks for future academic success. The mission of the Denmark Early Childhood Center is to educate the "whole" child by providing every child with a social, emotional, and academic foundation through various learning opportunities in a nurturing and supportive environment. The Denmark Early Childhood Center is home to a half-day four-year-old kindergarten program, an Early Childhood Special Education program, and a full-day five-year-old kindergarten program. The curriculum is designed to be developmentally appropriate for each child, with a focus on language experiences and active, exploratory learning. The Center also has specialists in Art, Physical Education, Media Center, and Music. Traditionally, strong parent involvement through an active Parent Teacher Organization and Parent Outreach pro-



gram has empowered parents and staff to develop strong relationships and facilitate activities that benefit all stakeholders.



### **ATHLETIC PARTICIPATION 2011-12**

Concussion testing for all incoming freshmen and juniors, or first time athletes for the 2011-12 school year, will be held on May 11, 2011 in room 207 at the high school. The concussion test is a 30 minute computer test that athletes take as a baseline score. If a student were to get a possible concussion, they would be re-tested and that score would be compared with the baseline score. Our current 2010-2011 spring athletes (8<sup>th</sup> grade track and all high school spring sport athletes) will complete the concussion testing during sports practice on May 4, 2011. Other athletes will need to sign up in the high school/middle school offices, or by calling 863-4200 ext. 0. Each athlete needs to complete one session — at 3:30, 4:00 or 4:30 p.m.

Parents and students that plan to participate in athletics next school year will be required to attend the 2011-12 Mandatory Athletic Informational Meeting at 7:00 p.m. on July 25, 2011 in the High School Cafetorium. Middle School parents and athletes are encouraged to attend the meeting but it is not mandatory in order to participate in athletics. If you are unable to attend the meeting on July 25, you will need to view the meeting (available after July 25, 2011) on the district website at <a href="https://www.denmark.k12.wi.us">www.denmark.k12.wi.us</a>. Go to the high school page, bottom right-hand corner and click on 2011 DHS Athletic Meeting Videos.

All student athletes (high school <u>and</u> middle school) will need to complete the 2011-12 Athletic Packet Forms which may be picked up in the office or downloaded from the school website at <u>www.denmark.k12.wi.us</u>. For high school forms, go to the high school page, click on Athletics, and then Athletic Packet Forms (8 pages). For middle school forms, click on the middle school page, click on Athletics, and then Athletic Packet Forms (2 pages). All forms need to be turned into the school office before the first day of practice along with a \$15 participation fee for the student's first sport of the school year. (If the student is participating in high school football, volleyball, basketball or wrestling also include a \$10 laundry fee.)

The dates for 2011 physicals will be July 19, 20, 21 & August 1, 2, 3 at Aurora Baycare. The \$25 cost for the physical is donated back to the Denmark High School Varsity Club by Aurora Baycare. Physical examinations taken before April 1 and thereafter are valid for the following two school years; physical examinations taken before April 1 are only valid for the remainder of that school year and the following school year.

### FOUR-YEAR-OLD KINDERGARTEN

WILL YOUR CHILD BE FOUR YEARS OLD BY SEPTEMBER 1, 2011?

It is with great pleasure that I invite your child to attend our four-year-old kindergarten program for the 2011-12 school year. If your child will be four years old on or before September 1, 2011, they are eligible to participate in our 4K program, focused on developing "the whole child."

A <u>parent orientation meeting</u> for those parents who have registered their child(ren) will be held on **May 25, 2011 at the Denmark High School cafetorium from 5:00-6:00 p.m.** Administration and the 4K teachers will share specific information about the school district and 4K program, including a curriculum overview, our parent outreach program, as well as transportation information. Any questions you may have about our 4K program can be addressed at that time.

Based on feedback received from some parents, we are exploring various programming options for Four-Year-Old Kindergarten beginning next fall. If you have a child enrolled for next school year, or have an age-eligible child to consider enrolling, we would appreciate your feedback regarding our program structure. We are considering offering a full-day rather than half-day program and providing child care before and after school for the 4K children. The attached survey is an opportunity for us to gauge possible parent interest in a full-day program and wraparound child care. Your responses will help the district make a decision on which program structure(s) to offer. **Please understand that the program preference you select will not guarantee that schedule will be offered for all students**. Please also note that all licensed child care options would be available on a first-come, first-served basis due to limited space availability. Child care, though run by an independent, licensed provider, would be located at the ECC. Once surveys are collected and reviewed, the final program structure and options will be determined and shared with all parents at the 4K Spring Meeting in May. We appreciate your timely response and feedback!!

<u>Current 4K Program Structure</u>: Our Four-Year-Old Kindergarten program currently runs four half days a week with one no school day, which is an outreach day for parent-student activities. The morning session runs 8:00 to 11:00 a.m. and the afternoon session runs from 12:00 to 3:00 p.m. This half-day structure traditionally has been the most desirable and beneficial to students for academic and social-emotional growth based on program history; however, with schedules and child care making this increasingly more difficult to accommodate, the full-day option is being considered once again.

### **CURRICULUM OVERVIEW**

The District has adopted the State Model Academic Standards in both core and elective subject areas in developing a District Professional Learning Community that focuses on three questions: "What do we expect students to learn and be able to do?" (Curriculum); "How will we know when they have learned it?" (Assessment); and "What will we do for those students who don't learn it or already know it?" (Differentiated Instruction and Intervention). In maintaining this Professional Learning Community, the district has adopted the curriculum mapping process to establish local benchmarks and grade level expectations for students at each grade level. Programs are developed to meet the needs of individual students within the classroom. An enrichment program is available to gifted students as well as a K-12 Special Education program.

These half-day care hours would available on days when school is in session and full days on non-school weekdays from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. based on space avail ability on a first-come, first-served basis at an approximate cost of \$12.50 per day for half-day care/\$25.00 per day for full-day care
<b>I WOULD</b> only be interested in <b>before or after school care</b> (6:00-8:00 a.m. or 3:00-6:00 p.m.) for my child on his/her regulation school days at an approximate cost of \$7.60-\$10.00 per day.
I WOULD NOT be interested in any child care options for my child at the ECC.
Option 2 – Full-Day Program  Full-Day Classes – Students would have school all day, two (2) or three (3) days a week, depending on enrollment. An additional non school weekday would be dedicated as a parent-student-school outreach day for activities. Child care at the ECC may be provided befor and after school from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on regular school days as well as on non school weekdays (weather permitting) on a first-come, first-served basis (i.e., if your child has school all day on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, full-day care may be provided on Tuesdays and Thursdays, based on limited space and availability at an approximate cost of \$25.00 per day).
<b>I WOULD</b> only be interested in <b>before or after school care</b> for my child on his/her three full school days at an approximate cost of \$7.60-\$10.00 per day.
I WOULD only be interested in child care for my child on <b>non-school days</b> opposite his/her regular school days (i.e., if my child's 4K session runs Monday, Wednesday, and Friday all day, I would prefer child care all day on Tuesdays and Thursdays at the ECC at an approximate cost of \$25.00 per day).
I WOULD be interested in <b>before/after school child care</b> for my child on his/her <b>regular school days</b> <u>AND</u> <b>full-day child care</b> on <b>non-school weekdays</b> opposite his/her regular school days (i.e., if my child's 4K session runs all day Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays, I would prefer before/after school child care on those days <u>and</u> also all-day on Mondays and Wednesdays at the ECC).
I WOULD NOT be interested in any child care options for my child at the ECC.






### WELCOME TO DENMARK SIGN

### NEWS FROM THE DESK OF TONY KLAUBAUF

The public school environment in Wisconsin is volatile, to say the least, at this time in our history. Obviously, Governor Walker's repair bill and bi-annual State Budget are driving a great deal of the uncertainty and anxiety within Wisconsin regarding planning for the next two budget cycles locally. However, there is also a great deal of change occurring outside of budgetary issues. The district has been and will continue to grapple with issues surrounding preparing students for education and employment opportunities that we cannot even envision. Creating a world class set of citizens who can read and find information efficiently, can easily adapt to change, are highly effective communicators, have creative problem solving skills and have a strong work ethic, are the students who will have the greatest chance of success as we move through the 21st century. Providing that education under difficult financial constraints is what is expected of all districts today.

Besides the financial challenges the district faces, there are many valuable experiences students have a chance to experience every day in our Denmark School District. In addition, some of the initiatives we have been developing, we believe, will help prepare students for the future.

- Providing training and technology tools to staff and students. Students will be competing with students from around the world. We are trying to fund, through a variety of sources, improving computer and other technologies that will enhance student learning. For the 2011-12 school year, we plan on having one-to-one computing for every child entering sixth grade (more information for these students and parents will come later). We will also be moving from textbooks to laptop computers in a number of high school science classes for the 2011-12 school year.
- We will continue to have all students learn two languages, with the goal of every student being competent in two languages by the time this year's Kindergarten students are seniors in high school. World language instruction will be advancing from Kindergarten to First Grade for 2011-12, while continuing to teach Spanish at the 5K level.
- We have a group of teachers and administrators working on a committee discussing 21<sup>st</sup> century learning for middle and high school students. While this committee is in its infancy, we want all students who graduate from Denmark to be engaged learners who can adapt to the changing expectations of higher education and the work world. The group is going to be discussing helping students grow in financial literacy, developing projects connected to real world applications, and others ways to engage older students during their middle and high school years.

These are just a few of the many ways the District is working to improve the education for students now and into the future.

Below is part of a recent letter to Mr. Nehls, high school principal, from a parent who visited the high school with the intent of open enrolling their children. As can be seen, it is a very positive letter about our district and, in particular, the high school. (Names have been changed and the letter altered slightly to protect confidentiality)

"Mr. Nehls,

The visitation to Denmark was a very good experience for us as well. Mary felt like she belonged and the focus on academics is all the girls are talking about. We did open enroll and will wait for the paper work. Beth, her guide, made Mary feel so comfortable and it helped both the girls feel like Denmark is the school for them. Our other daughter, Jane, was taking it all in and trying to be open minded...her observing stage. She is usually the dynamic one so it was interesting to see her so quiet and reflective. She did go home and talk non-stop to my husband about the school and how she and her siblings would excel. Another family we know open enrolled as well.

I must admit we were worried that we talked too much in the classrooms and disrupted learning; however, it helped the girls feel connected to the students. It was a very positive experience for all of us. Currently we are trying to help save the music department at our school. It is such a sad situation. I cannot begin to voice the difference in leadership within the two schools. We appreciate the vision and collaborative atmosphere in your school. And, the positive energy from everyone! We hope our family can be an active part of your community - despite the drive :-)"



### FOOD NUTRITION UPDATE

## Highlights of 2010 Child Nutrition Reauthorization December 13, 2010

- Foster children are automatically eligible for free meals.
- Allows schools in high-poverty areas to offer free meals to all students if the level of direct certification exceeds 40 percent.
- Requires school districts to gradually increase their "paid" lunch charges until the revenue per lunch matches the federal free reimbursement level.
- Allows only lower-fat milk options.
- Ensures that water is available free of charge during the meal service.
- Gives the USDA authority to establish national nutrition standards for all foods sold on the school campus throughout the school day.

### Highlights of the Proposed Rules in the National School Lunch and Breakfast Programs—January 13, 2011

- Starchy vegetables (e.g., white potatoes, corn, lima beans, and green peas) would be limited to one cup per week to encourage students to try new vegetables.
   Starchy vegetables cannot be served for breakfast.
- Low fat milk cannot be flavored. Only fat-free milk can be flavored.
- Half the grains offered during the week must be whole grain.
- Weekly requirements for dark green and orange vegetables, and legumes.
- Daily requirements for fruit and vegetables will increase.



### New Common Core State Standards Adopted in Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction adopted new Common Core State Standards (CCSS) in June, 2010. These new sets of standards were developed for English Language Arts and Mathematics for grades K-12 with an emphasis on college and career readiness. The CCSS were developed by the National Governor's Council and the Council of Chief State School Officers with a coalition of other national education experts through extensive national and international research. Most states have formally adopted the CCSS. Science and Social Studies CCSS are projected to be completed within the next two years.

In Wisconsin, the CESAs (Cooperative Educational Service Agencies) have designed and facilitated statewide "Investigation" sessions for teachers and administrators to begin to study these new academic standards. Students will be assessed on these new standards in 2014-15, which implies full implementation of these standards over the next four years. The English Language Arts standards offer a new complexity, rigor, depth, and comprehensiveness in the areas of reading, writing, speaking, listening, and language. As teacher teams attend the investigation sessions, they are learning not only what will be expected of their students but are also considering how their classroom instruction will need to be adjusted to meet these standards.

The new mathematics standards for grades K-12 offer complexity in mathematical concepts and practices and a sharper focus with increased rigor and depth of understanding. Because the expectations from grade level to grade level have shifted in their rigor, placement, and emphasis, districts are finding it necessary to take the time to study these standards and understand just what is being required of students – and also of instruction to meet these expectations.

The 2010-11 school year is a year of study, reflection, and investigation of these new standards. In the meantime, the current national system of accountability is still in place, where districts are measured for their "Adequate Yearly Progress" as measured by the WKCE (Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examination). As time progresses, work will follow regarding curriculum development and alignment to ensure the highest level of learning for our students in relation to the new standards.
