4K & 5K REGISTRATION

Four-year-old and five-year-old kindergarten registration for the **2014-2015** school year will be held at the Denmark Early Childhood Center office the week **of Feb. 24-28**. Parents of children who will be four years of age by Sept. 1, 2014 are eligible for four-year-old kindergarten and students who will be five years old by Sept. 1, 2014 are eligible for five-year-old kindergarten. Four-year-old kindergarten is held four half days a week, Monday through Thursday, with either morning or afternoon sessions. Five-year-old kindergarten is held five full days a week. If your child currently attends four-year-old kindergarten at the ECC they do not need to come in for 5K registration, as this is for **new students only**. Parents are asked to come to the Early Childhood Center office during the week of Feb. 24 to register their child/ren. Hours of registration are from 7:40 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. State Law requires school districts to verify each child's birth certificate as well as the child's immunization record. Parents must bring these documents when they register their child/ren. Registration packets were mailed out on Feb. 7. If you didn't receive a registration packet, or if you have any questions or concerns, please call the ECC Office at 863-4175.

REFERENDUM NEWS

VOTE APRIL 1, 2014

"Shall the School District of Denmark, Brown, Manitowoc and Kewaunee Counties, Wisconsin be authorized to exceed the revenue limit specified in Section 121.91, Wisconsin Statutes, by \$800,000 for the 2014-2015 school year, by \$900,000 for the 2015-2016 school year; and by \$900,000 for the 2016-2017 school year, for non-recurring purposes consisting of operating expenses, including ongoing educational programming and maintenance, enhancing safety and security, transportation and technology?

WHY IS THERE A REFERENDUM TO EXCEED THE REVENUE LIMIT?

The Denmark School District is attempting to:

Maintain current classes and programs for students.

Continue to improve district technology and safety programs.

Re-surface parking lots and playgrounds that are run down because of age.

Provide safe transportation for students to and from school.

WHY IS THE DENMARK SCHOOL DISTRICT IN THIS FINANCIAL POSITION?

- Twenty years ago districts were locked into revenue/spending limits. Districts like Denmark were permanently locked into low spending from that point forward. Districts that spent a greater amount per student were also locked into a higher rate of spending.
- The student population at Denmark has decreased by 174 students in the past 10 years, or 10.31%. Less enrollment equals less revenue.
- The combination of being locked into a low revenue limit and having less students to make up for that difference is the biggest cause of the deficit.

WHAT HAS THE SCHOOL DISTRICT DONE TO CUT COSTS?

- Since the 2003-04 school year, staff has been reduced from 197.47 to 170.50 a total of 13.7 % while enrollment decreased 10.31%.
- Total reductions including staff cuts have totaled \$2,818,108.

NEXT GENERATION BEST PLACE TO WORK

NURSE NOTES

Information about Scabies

Scabies is an infestation of the skin caused by parasitic mites called Sarcoptes scabei. The female mite burrows under the top layer of the skin to lay eggs. The eggs hatch and can continue the infestation until proper treatment is applied.

Scabies is most commonly transmitted by having direct, prolonged, skin-to-skin contact with a person already infested with scabies, usually among sexual partners and household members. The signs and symptoms of scabies are:

- Intense itching, especially at night and over most of the body.
- Presence of the mite burrows, often forming a zigzag pattern on the skin.
- Presence of rash or skin lesions such as red raised bumps, blisters, brown nodules, or pimple like irritations.

In healthy people, if they have never been infested with scabies before, symptoms (itching and redness of the skin) appear approximately 4-6 weeks after infection. Scabies infestations should be treated as soon as possible. A person with scabies can pass it on to another person as long as they have not been treated. Diagnosis is most commonly made by having a healthcare provider examine the burrows or rash. Scabies can be treated by applying one of several available prescription lotions or creams.

OPEN ENROLLMENT

Open enrollment, also known as school choice, allows parents to submit an application for their child to attend school in a district other than the one in which they live. Denmark welcomes applicants to the open enrollment program. For online information, please see Denmark's website www.denmark.k12.wi.us. Click "open enrollment" on the left menu. Application dates for the 2014-2015 school year are February 4 to April 30, 2014. A separate application must be submitted for each child. Current open enrolled students do not need to reapply, except for current 8th grade students that will be entering high school for 2014-15 and "tuition waiver" students. Students who need to reapply will receive letters and instructions through the postal service.

DANCE TEAM TRYOUTS

The Denmark Dance Team will be hosting tryouts for the 2014-2015 season in early April. Tryout dates and times will be officially announced in early March. Announcements will be made at school along with flyers and status updates on Facebook. Please "like" Facebook.com/denmarkdanceteam for more information. Artsonia is an online art gallery (www.artsonia.com) that displays student artwork from across the country. We here at Denmark have found it to be a great way to display our student work at all levels. So, how will you know if your student's work is displayed? Each student that is chosen for the museum will have a username that includes their first name followed by a number. Art instructors will send a note home for parents with each student that has artwork displayed on the Artsonia website. The note will explain how to find a specific student's artwork. Once you create a username, you can receive notifications when your student's work is added to the site.

Artsonia's website is accessible on the district website on each of the individual building's home pages. One can quickly go to the website and type in Denmark Elementary School, Denmark Middle School, or Denmark High School to access the different exhibits. Artsonia is a very safe website that protects the students' identity but allows visitors to write comments about the artwork and become a "fan" of a student. This is a great way to share your student's work with family and friends. Artsonia has a variety of items that may be ordered with the student's artwork printed on them. It is optional, but if items are ordered, 20% is given back to our art department. Please take a moment to view the beautiful artwork created by Denmark students. Art provides an opportunity for students to apply what they learn in all of the disciplines. It sparks creativity and innovation in the minds and hands of all.

ART AWARDS

There have been many exciting things happening in Art at Denmark High School in anticipation of Youth Art Month, which is the month of March. A regional art show was held in February at the Bergstrom-Mahler Museum of Glass in Neenah and over 75 artworks from Northeast Wisconsin schools were displayed. From that group, 50 were chosen to move on to the state exhibit which will be held in the Capitol Rotunda in Madison from March 22 to April 4. Included in those 50 selections were all three Denmark High School entries created by seniors Brooke Kittell and Cheelecee Thao, and junior Ashley Bernhardt. DENMARK WORLD LANGUAGE PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The World Language curriculum in the Denmark School District helps students build proficiency in the four language domains: speaking, listening, reading, and writing. We build students' knowledge and application skills with material presented in textbooks, digital resources, and through conversational and classroom activities. As students progress through the levels of languages offered, they learn increasingly more complex grammatical concepts through units focused on a variety of real-life themes. Currently, students in grades 4K-3rd receive instruction weekly in a second language with the intention of this curriculum expanding to include all grades 4K-5th in future years.

Research shows that children who learn a second language early in life have enhanced problem-solving capabilities, strengthen their ability to focus attention, have stronger memory abilities that improve learning processes, are open to a variety of perspectives, are able to think divergently and convergently, possess enhanced interpersonal communication skills, and may have a slower rate of decline of cognitive processes as they age. Language learning corresponds with higher academic achievement and supports the 21st century learning and skills standards.

We are excited to be able to offer students the opportunity to acquire a second language as they progress through school, increasing their capacity for global success. NEW SMARTER BALANCED ASSESSMENT SYSTEM IN WISCONSIN SCHOOLS

In 2010, Wisconsin joined the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium, one of the two national consortia that were formed to help establish a series of "next generation assessments" to measure students' career and college readiness. Beginning next school year, students in grades 3-8 will be taking these new online assessments in English Language Arts and mathematics. The Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Exam (WKCE) will continue for science and social studies in grades 4, 8, and 10. Additionally, all 9th and 10th grade students will be taking an ACT readiness test called ACT Aspire. All 11th grade students will take the ACT exam and the ACT Work Keys assessment, used to measure college and career readiness.

Smarter Balanced Practice Tests Available to Parents and Students

Practice Tests for each tested grade in both English Language Arts and mathematics are available to help all stakeholders build awareness of the Smarter Balanced Assessment functions and to increase teacher and student proficiency in navigating the applications, item types, and tools intended for operational assessment, as well as to provide a feel for the kind of items tested in Smarter Balanced Assessments. Practice Test questions include the full range of Smarter Balanced item types for both ELA and mathematics--selectedresponse items, constructed-response items, technology-enhanced items, and performance tasks. Scoring guides have been posted online for all available Practice Tests. Practice tests are available at https://sbacpt.tds.airast.org/student/
