DENMARK SCHOOL DISTRICT GOALS for 2014-15

After examining the school district's assessment results for 2013-14, along with the school district report card provided by the Department of Public Instruction, the emphasis for the near future will be on improving literacy among our students. While our school district scores were in the average range compared to other districts, we believe our students should be performing at a higher level as measured by state assessments. We have re-dedicated ourselves to improve student learning in the area of literacy.

The two district goals read as follows:

District Goal #1: All non-disabled and non-economically disadvantaged students will increase proficiency in reading compared to the state average for students of the same demographic population.

Rationale – Even students who were not disabled and did not come from economically disadvantaged homes did not score as well as comparable schools with the same demographics. All of our students need to perform better on state exams, which means district personnel and parents have to hold students accountable and make sure they are reading challenging material daily.

District Goal #2: All students with disabilities will show an average growth percentile increase of 35% in overall proficiency on the STAR assessment from Fall 2014 to Spring 2015.

Rationale – Students with disabilities (special education) as a group were far behind the regular education students in scoring on the statewide test. This is an area titled the "achievement gap." In other districts the achievement gap is usually considerable between students of poverty and those not in poverty. However, for our district, the gap is significant for students in our special education program.

Each school within the district is using the district literacy goal as a target in developing specific building goals focused on improving student learning. We have also reached out to other districts in the state that have been high achieving districts to learn from them and make improvements in our teaching and learning. We are quite confident student performance on state assessments will improve as we move forward.



BASEBALL/SOFTBALL DUGOUTS PROJECT

The dugouts on the east side of the Denmark Middle School, used by the Denmark JV and Freshmen Baseball Teams as well as the Denmark Pony League Team in summer, are nearing completion. The dugouts were first being considered in the fall of 2013 with a generous donation of \$2,500 by Schultz Trucking Enterprises (Dennis and Karen Schultz) of Denmark. However, because of weather delays, along with ball games and practices occurring from April through July, the project wasn't started until this September.

With the help of many local contractors, along with the Construction Class of Denmark High School, the project now nears completion. Tim Kapinos, Technology Education Instructor at Denmark, along with John Zellner, Building and Trades Instructor at NWTC, were the leaders in having students complete much of the work. Denmark High School students learned valuable construction skills in concrete block, framing and roofing work, along with gaining one college credit in the masonry program at NWTC. Students also obtained OSHA Safety Certification that will benefit them in any future construction jobs. Instructor John Zellner, who has worked with the Denmark School District on a number of other projects, also brought along apprentice students in the masonry program at NWTC to gain valuable experience. NWTC also provided a construction trailer for tools and storage during construction.

Other local contractors, businesses and organizations that helped with the construction were:

Denmark Area Youth Baseball and Softball – provided design and oversight

Deterville Lumber – supplied wood and roofing materials

Dick's Lawn Care – excavated the ground where the dugouts are placed

Allied Concrete – framed and poured the floors for the dugouts

Lakeland Doors – provided doors for storage area

Custom Fence - provided fence in front of dugouts

Denmark District Maintenance Staff – helped with numerous responsibilities

We appreciate the expertise of these local professionals. The total cost of the dugouts was approximately \$15,000 in materials and contractor costs. Besides the \$2,500 from Schultz Trucking, the district used money provided by Aurora, which was paid to the district for providing athletic training. This project was a win/win for the community, the students, and everyone who helped in the construction. Thanks to all.

FABTECH is part of the Fox Valley Technical College and offers two Caterpillar specific service technician career tracks. Each track is a one-year program.

After touring FABTECH, they then went to the Spanbauer Center, which is also part of Fox Valley Technical College, to tour the Construction Management and the Residential Building Construction programs. The students were able to tour the shops, see some of the machines in action, and experience first-hand the one year programs offered there. All of the programs of study that the students toured are careers that are in high demand right now, which was very encouraging to the students. It was a wonderful experience for all of the students that went.








HIGH SCHOOL ART
