REPLACEMENT OF FOOTBALL/TRACK POLES AND LIGHTS

On March 9, 2015, the Denmark School Board voted to support the replacement of the poles and lights for the football field and track area. While we knew this expense was going to be an issue in the near future, the urgency in replacing both the poles and lights has occurred because of safety and liability concerns.

We know that the original poles, brackets and light supports were built around 1971. They are close to 45 years old. Through the years, we obviously replaced the bulbs as they have gone out. About 10 years ago, the glass covers surrounding the bulbs began to come loose and they were wired into the supports to make sure they did not fall on people below. We also had the condition of the poles checked about 4-5 years ago. At that time, there was no immediate need to replace the poles, but there was some concern they would not last many more years as they crack and rot.

Near the end of last year's football season, we noticed the lights were beginning to burn out at a much higher rate than previous years. As we went through winter, Nick Phillips, our Director of Buildings and Grounds, and I began to investigate replacement options for the next few years. However, over winter one of the light casings, or supports, broke off and fell down. Had anyone been hit by this, they would have been severely injured if not killed. We are also finding more of the glass that covers the lights falling down, which is also a safety concern. We believe there is no immediate danger, but will ask track coaches and physical education teachers to be vigilant during high winds.

The total cost for completion of the project will be around \$150,000. Until we receive all the bids along with local contractors' costs, the exact final cost will not be known. We will make that figure public when the installation is completed. We certainly would like to seek donations and/or advertisements that would offset taxpayer money for the poles. If anyone is interested in either heading up a funding drive for the lights or making a donation, or would think about placing advertising on the actual poles, they should contact me. We do not have a set amount that we would charge for advertisement, but this is open for discussion. 1. Please provide some background and qualifications for the Denmark School Board.

1. Please provide some background and qualifications for the Denmark School Board.
