Denmark Police Changes

The information I normally include in the newsletter is good news about our district, financial information, or future events. On January 28, I sent an email out to our Denmark Staff regarding the Challenger Disaster that occurred 30 years ago. I thought the responses were insightful and might be interesting for community members as we reminisce about these events that shape our lives. In quotations is my original email and the responses are below.

"I was just reading about the Challenger disaster 30 years ago. Got me wondering how many of you were actually teaching, probably not many, and how many may not even remember that day. As I watched a short video of the flight, it brought back memories of being in front of 4th/5th graders at Amity School in Waupun and how excited I was to see a teacher in space. I had filled out some paperwork way back to try and be selected to do be the first teacher in space. (I probably didn't make the first cut.) But it meant a lot to have a teacher selected and how confused we (the teachers and students at this small school) were when the explosion happened. There was initial hope that somehow the astronauts survived. How devastating it was when announced there were no survivors.

At that time, people discussed this as a moment you would always remember where you were at that time. (Like another generation talks about the JFK shooting and others remember 9/11.) It was a really big deal, especially to us who loved the idea of traveling to space and having a teacher perform lessons from space."

- When the explosion happened, I remember exactly the feeling I had. It was very somber and confusing. We also had that weird sense that maybe someone would come on the TV to let us know that someone had survived. It was a dark day even as a child. Makes you appreciate all those who went before us and sacrificed so much so that we could have the knowledge about life and the world around us that we have today. Julie Noth
- I remember I was working at what used to be Valley Bank (now BMO) and watching it on TV. Devastating...Catherine Goral
- My sister was married/eloped that very day in Ohio. We (my parents, brothers, other sister, and myself) were not able to be there. We remember the day as well. Shelia Bialek
- I was in 8th grade at the time in Mr. Patt's social studies class at Washington Middle School when this happened...we were watching it on one of those giant TV's on a cart that we got from the AV room....man has technology changed....I remember there were a few traumatized classmates. Bill Otradovec
- I was a 4th Grade coach and I vividly remember walking back from the bathroom and everyone talking about it in the hallway. Chris Haese
- I was in 8th grade and we were planning our 8th grade carnival talking about Funyums. I went to a Catholic school, so after they made the announcement, we stopped what we were doing and said the Hail Mary. Kind of puts things into perspective ... talking about a snack food to praying for a person's life. Cynthy Freund
- I was here (as HS secretary) Sheri Kittel
- I was living in Sioux City, IA at the time. I was working as a prevention coordinator at an alcoholism treatment center. I had been to a conference in Sioux Falls, SD and was driving home. The announcer on the radio was talking about lift off and then the explosion reporting there couldn't possibly be any survivors. I had to pull over to the side of the road for a while. I prayed. Cindy Gruenberg
- I was teaching Family and Consumer Ed. in Darlington, WI (my alma mater) and I absolutely do remember the roller coaster of emotions first excitement that a teacher got to travel in space and then the ultimate disaster and how devastating it was. It ranks right up there with 9/11 and the JFK murder. Heidi Linden
- I was in 6th grade and we were watching the launch in the library. I remember the librarian who was generally very stern, standing in shock along with the rest of us. It is amazing how things stick when there is an emotional reaction!

- I was a senior in high school, looking forward to graduating in May and going off to college Rick Diny



- I was a freshman here in Mr. Glinicki's ag class in the classroom that is now used for the driver's ed. course. I think Sherry Rasmussen, a senior student, had just picked up the pink attendance slip that also included the lunch count. Sheryl DeLarwelle
- I was working my first good paying job in a foundry as this happened 3 years after graduation. The foundry shut down for the rest of the week for the tragedy as the owner himself used to be a teacher and wanted to pay his respects. Armand Daigneault
- I was a sophomore in high school. I remember one of my classmates coming down the stairs as I was leaving lunch and he announced to everyone in the stairwell that the Challenger blew up. You know how you get that sick to your stomach feeling from the shock? That's how I felt. Angel Charapata
- I was working at Parkview working in geriatrics so TV was on in a rec room, so unbelievable to watch the whole thing unfold. Jane Hertel
- As a 6th grader in Menominee, MI, I was thankful for my teachers to help me cope with the disaster. Such a terrible loss of life, so many brave people. Scott McPherson
- I was a sophomore in college, getting ready to go to work at the bar and grill on campus, when my fiancé called to tell me to turn on the TV. I just had a small black and white TV in my dorm at the time. Tammy Brunette
- I was in 6th grade as well. I remember our class being so excited that we had the opportunity to watch the launch live on TV. We spent weeks discussing and researching space and NASA in preparation for that day. I can still remember what it felt like to see the explosion on TV.........An image forever burned in my mind. Amy Schuh
- I was a seventh grader at Gillett High School. I remember watching it on a rolled in TV during my social studies class. Then we had to move to our next class which was science, and my teacher Mr. Brugink kept the newscast on and we watched it over and over again during that period. I remember he was quite upset. - I was a stay at home mom for my two girls at the time and I can remember watching it on a small TV in my kitchen. I was eight months pregnant with my son. I remember watching in disbelief of what had just happened. Whoa, where has the time gone! Diane Randerson
- What I remember most is President Reagan's remarks following the disaster. My awe at the power of language and its
 impact on people was born when he explained how the Challenger heroes had "slipped the surly bonds of earth and
 touched the face of God." Dave Harper
- I was teaching in the Madison School District (Allis Elementary) in the back gym. A third grade teacher (Mr. Bolander a very funny, always in a positive mood kind of guy) brought his class in and he had this very sad look on his face. He and his class were watching the event on TV all were in shock. Very sad.—Pat Chester
- I was visiting my aunt, uncle, and cousins in Ottawa, Ohio. My aunt screamed that the Challenger had exploded. Those of us who were in the kitchen came running into the living room. There was disbelief in what we were seeing on television. Antonio Saldana
- It was a freezing cold day below zero, and I was on break from college working for the neighbor for an incredible amount of money, \$5 an hour! I couldn't feel my feet or hands all day from the cold. It was a brutal day on many fronts Doug Kufalk
- My husband and I returned from living in Texas a couple months earlier and I was working at a little cafe in Luxemburg called Jim's 54 Café, as I watched with disbelief with my co-workers Joan Langenberg
- It was one of those moments that you watch over and over trying to wrap your mind around what just happened. One of those moments you will remember forever. Lori Knoflicek
- I was a new mom with a four month old baby in my arms needing a diaper change I stood there in disbelief with my daughter in my arms. It is a day I won't forget, just like the day JFK was killed and September 11th. Lynn Lyman

OPEN ENROLLMENT 2016-17

Open Enrollment, also known as school choice, allows parents to submit an application for their child to attend school in a district other than the one in which they live. Denmark welcomes applicants to the open enrollment program.

For online information, please see Denmark's website <u>www.denmark.k12.wi.us</u>. Click "Open Enrollment" under Quick Links on the left menu.

Application dates for the 2016-17 school year are February 1 – April 29, 2016.

A separate application must be submitted for each child. Current open enrolled students do not need to reapply, except for current 8th grade students that will be entering high school for 2016-17 and "tuition waiver" students. Students who need to reapply will receive letters and instructions through the postal service.

EARLY CHILDHOOD SCREENING

The School District of Denmark will be offering **Early Childhood Screening** for children who will be 3-4½ years of age by September 1, 2016. The school district will use census data to mail out developmental surveys to parents of these children, asking parents to complete the questionnaire and return promptly by mail. School professionals will score the questionnaire and provide written feedback to parents on the general developmental readiness levels of their child and provide suggestions for home activities to assist their children. In certain circumstances, the school district will invite children to participate in additional on-site screening to better assess school developmental readiness levels. Children identified with developmental delays from this additional on-site screening could be eligible for free school district services (i.e., speech and language therapy or early childhood special education programming).

If you have a child who will be **3 or 4 years old by September 1, 2016, p**lease watch for this developmental questionnaire in the mail. You should receive the survey between January 25 and February 5, 2016. We ask you to <u>please complete the survey and</u> return it promptly by mail to 450 N. Wall Street, Denmark, WI 54208.

For those families who have a child in this age range and do not receive this survey by February 12, 2016, please call the Early Childhood Center (863-4175) to request an early childhood screening parent questionnaire.

4K & 5K REGISTRATION

Four-year-old and five-year-old kindergarten registration for the **2016-17** school year will be held at the Denmark Early Childhood Center office the week of **Feb. 22-26**. Parents of children who will be four years of age by Sept. 1, 2016 are eligible for four-year-old kindergarten and students who will be five years old by Sept. 1, 2016 are eligible for five-year-old kindergarten.

Four-year-old kindergarten is held four half days a week, Monday through Thursday, with either morning or afternoon sessions. Five-year-old kindergarten is held five full days a week. If your child currently attends four-year-old kindergarten at the ECC they do not need to come in for 5K registration, as this is for **new students only**.

Parents are asked to come to the Early Childhood Center office during the hours of 7:40 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. during registration week. State Law requires school districts to verify each child's birth certificate as well as the child's immunization record. Parents must bring these documents when they register their children. Registration packets were mailed out the first week of February.
