### **2020-2021 Tax Levy**

The Denmark School Board approved the tax levy of \$7,305,450 for the 2020-21 school year. The 2019-2020 tax levy was \$7,307,317. The 2020-21 mill rate for the School District is \$8.36 per \$1,000 of property value. This is a decrease from the 2019-20 mill rate of \$8.82 per \$1,000 of property value. For \$100,000 of property value, this is a decrease of approximately \$45.44 per year. Please keep in mind, each municipality within the School District of Denmark can be and will be different than this general mill rate. Your school property tax decrease or increase will depend on if your property was improved, you were re-assessed or if there was growth within your municipality. There was an approximate increase of 5.4%

in the equalized property value in the District as a whole.

The School District of Denmark has historically been below the mill rate compared to most school districts, and is considered a low revenue district. Last year the average K-12 school district mill rate was \$9.37 per \$1,000 of property value. Currently we pay approximately \$101 less per \$100,000 of property value than the average K-12 school district in Wisconsin.

With this year's budget, we are able to maintain our staffing and programing, stay on track with our facility and maintenance plan, keep the tax levy about the same, lower the mill rate and will look to pay down our new facility referendum debt with any year end funds.

### Making the Best Out of A Really Difficult Situation

With two young school aged children of my own, I know what parents are going through with balancing work, child care and on top of that, supporting their children in virtual education. My children have been on quarantine twice due to close contact and it seems like this situation is never going to end.

As an educator, I know that the best place for our children is to be in school. Our team is doing everything we can to balance safety and education for our students, staff and community. We started school in-person on September 1<sup>st</sup>. We came back because we believed it is what was best for students' education along with their mental and physical well being. By following COVID-19 guidelines and cleaning procedures, we can do it in a manner that mitigates spread. We know we can't stop it completely.

After four weeks of in person education, a shortage of available staff and COVID-19 numbers increasing around us, the District moved into virtual school for three weeks. Knowing and learning from our experiences every step of the way, we developed a short term schedule of in-person and virtual learning to get kids in school as much as possible and mitigate spread.

Just as our local organizations and businesses, we are doing our best to keep moving forward as safe as possible. I need to commend all the staff in the School District of Denmark for not only their hard work, but doing whatever they can to support our students. As a community, we will get through this difficult time.

#### School District of Denmark Facility Study - Phase 2

In August 2019, the Board of Education had a public presentation on Phase I of the facility study and educational needs assessment that Miron Construction and Bray Architects conducted for the District. Over the past year the District has prioritized our maintenance needs District-wide. As a District we have developed a five year working maintenance plan for the District. With Phase 1 of the facility study completed in January 2020, the District will begin working on Phase 2 which includes facility plans, options and solutions that meet the needs of our educational programming. Some of the key focus areas from the facility study include traffic flow, bus drop off and pick-up and the Early Childhood Center.

### SCHOOL DISTRICT OF DENMARK ANNUAL NOTICE OF NON-DISCRIMINATION 2020-2021 School Year

The School District of Denmark prohibits all forms of unlawful discrimination against students and other persons in all aspects of the District's programs and operations. Accordingly, consistent with Wis. Stat. §118.13, no person shall unlawfully be denied admission to any public school in this District, or be denied participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be discriminated against in any curricular, extracurricular, pupil service, recreational or other program or activity because of the person's sex, sexual orientation, race, color, national origin, ancestry, religion, creed, pregnancy, marital or parental status, or physical, mental emotional or learning disability. The District likewise requires and enforces nondiscrimination in a manner consistent with the rights and obligations established under all applicable federal civil rights laws, including the current provisions of Titles IV and VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (race, color, religion, sex, or national origin), Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (sex), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act (disability), the Americans with Disabilities Act (including Title II of the ADA, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability in state and local government services), and the civil rights provisions associated with the District's participation in federal meal programs.

All District career and technical education opportunities are offered to students on a nondiscriminatory basis. The District offers career and technical education programs in Animal Science, Architecture and Construction, Automotive Technician, Business Management, Education, Engineering, Health Sciences, Information Technology, Manufacturing, Marketing, and Plant Sciences.

Admission to these programs is based on interest and aptitude, age appropriateness, course prerequisites, and class space available. The District will take steps to assure that lack of English language skills will not be a barrier to admission and participation in all educational and vocational programs.

Children of homeless individuals and unaccompanied homeless youth (youth not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian) as identified under federal law shall have equal access to the same free, appropriate public education, including comparable services, as provided to other children and youth who reside in the District. Homeless children and youth shall not be required to attend a separate school or program for homeless children and shall not be stigmatized by school personnel.

The District shall provide legally-required accommodations and appropriate educational services or programs for students who have been identified as having a disability, regardless of the nature or severity of the disability. The District shall also provide for the reasonable accommodation of a student's sincerely held religious beliefs with regard to examinations and other academic requirements. Requests for religious accommodations shall be made in writing and approved by the building principal.

When acceptable to the complaining party, the District encourages informal resolution of discrimination complaints and related concerns. However, a formal complaint resolution procedure is available to address allegation of unlawful discrimination and/or any alleged violation of the District's equal educational opportunities policies.

### Denmark School District Preschool Screening Notice Children Age 3 (and turning 3 or 4)

In Accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and the Child Find Law, Denmark School District follows a procedure to locate, refer and identify, as early as possible young children who are in need of an Early Intervention Program or Early Childhood Services.

If you live in the Denmark School District and have a child who is age 3 or turning age 3 or 4 during the current school year, please notify the Denmark School District's Early Childhood Office at 920-863-4177.

Once you have contacted the school, you will be placed on a list to receive a questionnaire to complete called the Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ). The ASQ is sent in early January of the current school year and helps the district Child Find Team determine if further screening is needed for your child.
