A New Year & New Opportunities

We ended the first month of school with an outstanding Homecoming week. The community support for our students was outstanding and it's hard to beat the 5th grade class singing the national anthem before the football game.

This year we have several outstanding new opportunities for our students. Over fifty junior and senior students are participating in youth apprenticeships ranging from healthcare to construction and everything in between. Eighteen future healthcare workers are

getting a head start through a new partnership with Bellin College, and six students are participating in the Ahnapee Auto and Diesel program through NWTC. Throughout all levels, our teachers create and advise great opportunities for our students.

Our 2019 facilities study and planning has led us to a referendum that will move our youngest learners to our elementary school, create a designated bus area, and add a new secure entrance to our elementary school. This will ultimately move everything to one campus. As deemed a low spending district by the state of Wisconsin we have had to support our overall budget with an operational referendum for over a decade. Residents to vote on two school referendum questions November 8

Denmark School District residents will have the opportunity to vote on two referendum questions on the November 8, 2022 ballot. **Question 1** renews the existing operational referendum, so the District can continue to offer all students high-quality academic and extra-curricular programs and services. **Question 2** is a facilities improvement referendum to expand the elementary school and close the ECC. All Denmark students would be in one campus location, with less travel time between buildings and more time for teachers to be with students.



Preliminary Plan: Referendum Question 2

The proposed plan would construct an addition on the existing elementary school and close the ECC building. The plan would also improve the safety of the pick-up and drop-off areas and reduce traffic congestion in the neighborhood.

- Provide classrooms and support areas specifically designed for early childhood students.
- Build a cafeteria and multi-purpose gym for students in 4K through fifth grade.
- Reconfigure drop-off and pick-up areas to improve safety by better separating bus traffic and pedestrians.
- Plan for a second story on the addition to accommodate future enrollment growth.
- Provide a dedicated, secure entrance to better monitor and control visitor access.

ESTIMATED SCHOOL TAX MILL RATE IMPACT

There are two questions on the November 8 ballot. Question 1 renews the operational referendum at \$925,000 annually through the 2025-26 school year with no impact to the current mill rate. Question 2 is for the proposed plan above, not to exceed \$31 million with a tax mill rate impact of \$0.15 per \$1,000 of fair market property value.

Mill rate estimate based on 2021 equalized valuation with 1% annual growth thereafter, borrowings amortized over 21 years at a planning interest rate of 4.75%. Mill rate impact for Question 2 represents the estimated change in mill rate for referendum debt over the 2021-22 rate. (Baird)



Denmark School District Preschool Screening Notice Children Age 3 (and turning 3)



In Accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and the Child Find Law, Denmark School District follows a procedure to locate, refer and identify, as early as possible young children who are in need of an Early Intervention Program or Early Childhood Services.

If you live in the Denmark School District and have a child who is age 3 or turning age 3 during the current school year, please notify the Denmark School District's Early Childhood Office at 920-863-4177.

Once you have contacted the school, you will be placed on a list to receive a questionnaire to complete called the Ages and Stages Questionnaire (ASQ). The ASQ is sent in early January of the current school year and helps the district Child Find Team determine if further screening is needed for your child.




































Denmark Technology and Engineering

Annual Notice Child Find Special Education Referral and Evaluation

Child Find: The Denmark School District must locate, identify, and evaluate all resident children with disabilities, including children with disabilities attending private schools, regardless of the severity of their disabilities. The school district has a special education screening program to locate and screen all children with suspected disabilities who are residents of the Denmark School District and who have not graduated from high school. Upon request, the Denmark School District will screen any resident child who has not graduated from high school to determine whether a special education referral is appropriate. Children, ages three to twenty-one, suspected of having a disability should be referred to the Director of Pupil Services, who in turn will see that all necessary evaluations are conducted. Evaluations will be completed by the IEP (Individual Education Program) team members after parental permission has been secured. The IEP team will determine if the child has a disability and is in need of special education services. An appropriate placement will be made by the IEP team including parent(s)/guardian(s) and appropriate required school personnel. All procedures followed in the identification and provision of service to children with a disability will be conducted in accordance with state and federal laws and regulations.

Referral:

Any person, including parents, who reasonably believes that a child is a child with a disability may and should refer the child to a local educational agency, LEA. A person wishing to make a referral must make it in writing. The referral should explain why the person thinks the child has a disability. Contact the special education office for a referral form. (863-4030 or otradovp@denmark.k12.wi.us)

Getting Consent to Evaluate:

Within 15 business days of receiving a referral to evaluate a student, or initiating a reevaluation, the IEP team must complete its review of the referral information and send the parent/guardian a request for consent to evaluate, or if no additional data are necessary, notify the parents of that determination. "Business day" means Monday through Friday except for Federal and State holidays. Parents can refuse to give consent to evaluate, but if a school district feels strongly a child needs to be evaluated, they may go to due process to get permission to test. (For a re-evaluation, consent is not required.)

Determining Eligibility:

Within 60 calendar days of receiving parent consent to evaluate, or informing parents that no additional assessment or evaluation data are needed, the LEA/School District must complete its evaluation of the student and determine whether the student is or continues to be a "child with a disability" under IDEA.

The 60-day timeline may be extended for the following reasons:

- *When the student is being evaluated for a specific learning disability for the first time, and the school needs more time to gather information about a student's response to interventions-Rtl.
- *When a student transfers from one district to another during the 60-day time period.
- *When the parent repeatedly refuses or fails to make the student available for testing for an evaluation or a reevaluation.

IEP and Placement:

Within 30 calendar days of determining a student is or continues to be a "child with a disability", the IEP team must meet to develop an IEP and determine a placement for the student. *If agreed upon by the parent, the IEP and placement meeting can take place at the same time of the eligibility meeting. However, if a parent needs time to review information, another meeting will be set up.

At the IEP/Placement meeting, a parent/guardian can deny placement and services and a school cannot override this decision. Only one parent's consent is required.

- *Once per year, an annual IEP meeting is held to review IEP goals, services, and placement.
- *Every 3 years the IEP team will conduct a reevaluation unless agreed upon by parents and the IEP team that it is unnecessary. The same above timeline is used for reevaluations.

Annual Notice 504 /IHP (Individual Health Plan) Services

Qualifying for 504 Services

504 plans are for K–12 public school students with disabilities. Section 504 defines "disability" in very broad terms. That's why children who aren't eligible for an IEP may qualify for a 504 plan. Section 504 defines a person with a disability as someone who:

- * Has a **medical record** of the impairment
- * Has a physical or mental impairment that "substantially" limits one or more major life activity
- * The disability "substantially" limits ability to learn and participate in the general education classroom
- * Student won't recover from this condition

Having a disability doesn't automatically make a student eligible for a 504 plan. Examples of medical conditions that might qualify for a 504 Plan: ADD/ADHD, Allergies, Anxiety, Asthma, Epilepsy, Depression, Diabetes, Dyslexia, Migraines, Narcolepsy, etc

What is a 504 plan?

A 504 plan can help students with learning and attention issues learn and participate in the general education curriculum. A 504 plan outlines how a child's specific needs are met with accommodations and other services. These measures remove barriers to learning. This type of plan falls under Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. This is the part of the federal civil rights law that prohibits discrimination against public school students with disabilities, including students with learning and attention issues who meet certain criteria. A student with a 504 plan usually spends the entire school day in a general education classroom.

What does a 504 plan contain?

There is no standard 504 plan required by the law. Every school district handles it a little differently. In general, a 504 plan should include the following elements, all tailored to a child's individual needs:

- * Specific accommodations, supports or services
- * Names of the school professional that will provide each service
- * The name of the person responsible for ensuring the 504 plan is implemented

A 504 plan can provide related services, such as OT and Counseling. If you're already familiar with what an IEP includes, you'll notice that a 504 plan is less detailed. For example, a 504 plan doesn't include annual goals. Learn more about the *difference between 504 plans and IEPs*.

Type of Accommodations: Accommodations

**IHP - Individual Health Plan (created and monitored by school nurse)

An IHP can be developed and implemented for any student with a health condition that can negatively impact their access to appropriate learning. A temporary IHP plan can be developed for a student who has a temporary condition from which he/she will recover. (concussion, broken arm/leg, surgery on hand etc.)

504 Coordinator: School District Psychologist

IHP Coordinator: School District Nurse

Annual Notice of Suicide Prevention

Any person working with students who suspects a child is considering suicide, must contact the building counselor and building administrator. If any person working with students hears the student verbalize suicide ideation, they should take that student to the building counselor immediately so appropriate actions can be taken. A student with suicidal ideation should **never** be left alone - therefore they should not be sent to the counselor without an escort.

The School District of Denmark has staff trained in mental health and signs of suicide. Members of this staff teach the SOS (Signs of Suicide) curriculum to students in 7th grade and 9th grade. Staff are also available to intervene in crisis situations. Middle School and High School students have the suicide hotline number on the back of their student IDs for counties of Brown, Kewaunee, and Manitowoc.

ANNUAL NOTICE HOMELESS CHILDREN AND YOUTH

The McKinney-Vento Act defines homeless children and youth as:

Children and youth who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, and includes children and youth who are:

- * sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason
- * living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations
- * living in emergency or transitional shelters
- * abandoned in hospitals
- * living in a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings
- * living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings; and migratory children who qualify as homeless because the children are living in circumstances described above.

If you are personally aware of or are acquainted with any children or youth who may qualify according to the above criteria, the School District provides the following assurances to parents and guardians of homeless children and youth and unaccompanied homeless youth:

- * The child or youth shall be immediately enrolled and allowed to fully participate in school, even if unable to produce records normally required for enrollment (e.g., academic records, immunization and other required health records, proof of residency, or other documentation) or has missed application or enrollment deadlines during any period of homelessness.
- * Homeless children and youths are not stigmatized or segregated on the basis of their status as homeless and have full and equal educational and related opportunities.
- * Meaningful opportunities to participate in the education of their children including special notices of events, parent-teacher conferences, newsletters, and access to student records.
- * Immediate enrollment and transportation to the school of origin. "School of origin" means the school that a child or youth attended when permanently housed or the school in which the child or youth was last enrolled, including a preschool.
- * Written explanation of any decisions related to school selection or enrollment made by the school, the local educational agency, or the State educational agency involved, including the rights of the parent, guardian, or unaccompanied youth to appeal and receive prompt resolution of such decisions.

How Do Students Qualify for Free/Reduced Lunch?

Household size and income determine your status for free/reduced lunch benefits. Eligibility for foster children is based on the children's income alone, not the household income where they reside.

Only one application is needed per household (available in every school office) and can be submitted to your school office or sent to Kristi Buhr, 450 N. Wall St., Denmark, WI 54208.

Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling can discuss the decision with school officials. A formal appeal can be requested by phone or in writing to Katie Rabenhorst, School Board President, 4792 R. Kane Lane, Denmark, WI 54208 (920) 819-9786.

The School District of Denmark participates in the National School Lunch & Breakfast Program and makes these available to students for a fee.

- 10% of donations stay in the Denmark community
- Drive-up guests must pay with cash
- Pre-registered guests are processed first on the day of the event (minimal waiting)




