Colder Weather

As snow trickles into our forecast, please make sure your child has adequate clothing for the weather. Our students will have outdoor recess as long as the weather is 0 or warmer with the windchill. Please make sure your child has a hat, gloves/mittens, boots, snow pants, and a jacket that is warm enough for the dropping temperatures that are labeled with their name. In addition, if your child has an extra set of clothing at school it would be best to check with your child's teacher to determine if these clothes should be switched for warmer items.

Parking

For those that drop-off and pick-up your child, parking in Winter presents a unique set of challenges. Please see the map that provides you with parking opportunities at the ECC. Any blacktop to the South (the old bank and ball diamond) are technically not ECC property and, therefore, have no designated parking spots. Please ensure the safety of yourselves and others if/when parking in these areas, especially in Winter. Please adhere to the painted lines in our parking lot as well.

N Wall St

N Wall St is usually closed to thru traffic, with the exception of buses during the morning arrival. We recommended navigating through the parking lot, behind the BMO Harris Bank and Lickety Splits, and exiting by the softball diamonds.

Bus Path

This is the path our buses take everyday during arrival and dismissal. Please make sure this pathway is cleared with parking in our parking lot.

As a parent or caregiver, you may see your child behave in a way that doesn't make sense and ask yourself, "Why does she keep doing that?" It can be very frustrating, especially when it seems like it should be easy for your child to figure out on her own a more appropriate way to behave. In moments like this, it is important to remember that children continue to use a behavior because it works! Your child's behavior is a powerful communication tool that she uses to tell you what she needs or wants. 


SNOW DAYS / LATE STARTS

<u>Art</u>



Kindergarten students completed their Arlo dog portraits. They learned how to create a furry texture using lines, how to create a tint by painting white over yellow, and used cool colors and symmetry in their backgrounds. Students chose a geometric shape for Arlo's glasses and made them extra fancy with dots and lines.

Students are currently working on their texture turkeys. For this lesson students are following a draw along using curvy organic shapes, creating different texture rubbings inside the turkey's feathers using texture plates and peeled crayons, and painting the turkey with watercolor paint. Gobble! Students will be working on a special holiday lesson next.

Ask your student how they made the texture on their turkey's feathers.

Music



Students are starting to learn about the form of a song with an" A" and "B" section. We are also continuing to learn about instruments that start with different letters with our friend Callie the Cowgirl. Students will also be using the boomwhackers to play some fun Christmas songs!

Spanish



Kindergartners have been working on both colors and numbers in Spanish class. Many kids can already count to ten in Spanish. Now we want to identify the correct number word to correspond to the quantity. Color words can be a bit more difficult than numbers, so students might take a little longer to remember. They will be able to identify and point out the color they hear, before they will be able to name the

colors. Soon students will also be working on shapes. Students have been signing songs in Spanish since September. Ask them to sing you our "Buenas Tardes" song.

Physical Education



By now, all kindergartners should be underhand tossing experts!! "Toes - T - Step - Swing" - and hopefully they remember which foot to take

their step with $^{\Theta}$. We have worked very hard on this skill for much of the month of November. We had a week of stations which included: tossing into cones (similar to the Cornhole Toss Backyard Game),

tossing with a higher arc into a lowered basketball hoop, and tossing Beanie Baby cats into cans decorated to look like the "Cat in the Hat". Along with these tossing stations, there was a fitness station, a "cardio" obstacle course and a balancing station. We ended the month introducing cup-stacking skills. Cup stacking or speed stacking is excellent for students to work on eye-hand coordination and helps students to use both their right and left sides of their brain. When students are sport stacking, they are crossing the "midline" of their bodies and developing new connections in their brains. These new connections help to spur brain growth which promotes greater academic achievement. ~Mrs. Chester and Mr. Wojta

With sincere thanks and much appreciation." - John Influenza (the flu) is an infection of the nose, throat and lungs caused by influenza viruses. There are many different strains of the flu virus, and they are constantly changing. These viruses cause illness, hospital stays and deaths in the United States each year.

The flu can be very dangerous for children. Each year about 20,000 children younger than 5 years old are hospitalized due to flu complications, including pneumonia.

FLU FACTS FOR PARENTS

How can I protect my child against the flu?

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the first and most important thing you can do is to get a flu vaccine for yourself and your child. Talk to your doctor.

 Vaccination is recommended for everyone 6 months of age and older.

What can I do if my child gets sick?

Talk to your doctor early if you are worried about your child's illness.

- Children 5 years and older without other health problems: Consult your doctor as needed and make sure your child gets plenty of rest and drink enough fluids.
- Children younger than 5 and especially those younger than 2 — and those of any age who have a long-term health condition such as asthma or diabetes are at greater risk for serious complications from the flu. Talk with your doctor.

What if my child seems very sick?

Seek emergency care or take your child to a doctor right away if he/she has any of the warning or emergency signs below:

- Fast breathing or trouble breathing
- Bluish or gray skin color
- Not drinking enough fluids (not going to the bathroom or making as much urine as he or she normally does)
- Severe or persistent vomiting
- Not waking up or not interacting
- Being so irritable that the child does not want to be held
- Flu-like symptoms improve but then return with fever and worse cough

What are the symptoms of the flu?

Symptoms of the flu can include fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, chills, fatigue and sometimes vomiting and diarrhea. Some people with the flu will not have a fever.

IMPORTANT!

Teach children to cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue, or to cough into their sleeve, not their hand! Throw tissues in

Throw tissues in the trash after you use them.

Can my child go to school or day care if he or she is sick?

No. Your child should stay home to rest and to avoid giving the flu to other children or caregivers.

When can my child go back to school after having the flu?

Keep children home for at least 24 hours after their fever is gone. (Fever should be gone without the use of a fever-reducing medicine.) A fever is defined as 100°F (37.8°C) or higher.



Most experts believe that flu viruses spread mainly by droplets made when people with the flu cough, sneeze or talk. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby. Less often, a person might get the flu by touching something that has flu virus on it and then touching their own mouth, eyes or nose.
