Denmark Elementary Student Placement 2022-2023

Elementary school staff will soon begin the process of student placement for the following school year. Our belief is that classes should be balanced. This means classes should be equitable in size and include students with a variety of ability levels, talents, and special needs. In order to achieve this balance, information is gathered from classroom teachers, specialists, and guidance personnel.

The following criteria are considered when placing students:

- Girl/Boy Ratio: We strive to maintain a balance of boys and girls in each classroom.
- Class Size: We strive to balance the number of students in each classroom.
- Variety of Abilities: We strive to have heterogeneous grouping in all classrooms. Students learn from each other at all levels.
- **Special Placements**: (Acceleration, Special Education, Remedial Reading, etc.) In order to best meet the needs of children and utilize special teacher time effectively, students with specific academic needs may be clustered together.

We strongly believe that this detailed and collaborative process creates a learning environments that benefits all students. Our goal is to place all children in classrooms well suited for their learning needs. Much time and care will be given to each child's placement. Because of the input and thought given we are reluctant to make changes once this process occurs. While it may seem difficult to imagine, moving just one child can disrupt the balance of an entire classroom.

Information supplied by parents will be considered; however, due to the need for balanced classrooms it is not possible to meet every request. Should you want to share any insight about your child's strengths, needs, and learning style, I will take into consideration pertinent information about your child's learning style and needs, over the summer.

Parent tips and Tricks

Confidence is essential for a child's social and emotional development. When children feel good about themselves and who they are, they can feel positive about trying new things, learning new skills and building strong relationships. Key signs in young children that suggest they may lack confidence and self-esteem include frequent mood swings, tantrums, difficulty

learning new skills or managing positive relationships. Here are some tips and tricks that can help a child with low confidence:

- 1. Start by demonstrating your own self-confidence, even when you feel negative or stressed. Stay positive as much as possible when teaching your kids.
- 2. Avoid getting upset over mistakes. Let kids know that everyone makes mistakes and the important thing is to learn from them, not dwell on them.
- 3. Encourage kids to persevere and stay confident knowing that they don't need to succeed at everything all the time. This may teach them resilience.
- 4. Discuss their personal interests. Success in hobbies and sports will boost their self-esteem and help them learn new skills.
- 5. Invite them to make choices. Learning to make simple choices while young will help prepare your child for the more difficult choices they'll face as they grow.
- 6. Celebrate their efforts. Show them you value the work they're doing, whether they're toddlers starting to talk or teenagers practicing a sport. Depending on what may be impacting your child's self-esteem, continue to participate in their development and seek opportunities to build confidence and express their feelings, and seek additional support if they are struggling


